
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CLARITY

<u>What</u> is ensemble clarity?

How do I achieve it?

WHAT

Theoretical – creating a common understanding of the subject matter

Practical – executing performance elements in the same way

HOW

Ensemble music consists of four content areas:

HOW

1. Sound organization(sonic events within time—pulse)

2. Sound production

HOW

3. Sound relationships

(balance, blending of sound colors, role/function of music)

 Communication (artistic elementsstyle, dynamics, cadential clarity, etc.)

How Step 1

Create a detailed but concise vocabulary of individual and ensemble performance. How Step 2 Theoretically guide the students' listening to create awareness of what is expected from individual performance and how those sounds relate to others.

How Step 3

Develop analysis skills of the individual player in regard to the specific and expected definitions of performance skills.
